- Add more interactive aspects in class.
- All. Quizzes subjective. Grades subjective. Commentary irrelevant. Would be class example with in depth commentary on assignments and still receive inadequate grades
- At some point I started missing lectures because I did not feel like they were helpful in my learning and they didn't really correlate well with the discussion. There were a few times where the lecture was about how to skim or write instead of actual content which I thought was irrelevant and wasted time. These things can be added as resources in blackboard instead. Again, the only time I felt like the course was intellectually stimulating was when I was completing my assignments and sometimes in discussion.
- I felt at times the class went fast, or everyone understood pretty quickly but me.
- I have no improvements to suggest.
- I think it was a pretty fine course the way it is
- I was constantly bored and found it so hard to concentrate. For a gen ed class, it required more work and engagement than my major related courses. The discussion sections were useless and the TA has an attitude problem "I'll wait"-The guy with glasses, multiple times. I understand it was because of our lack of engagement, but there were too many readings for a gen ed and the actual material is so difficult to absorb. I wanted him to actually discuss the topics of the week because I felt like the actual lectures were a waste of time more often than not.

Something else I noticed while reading a lecture transcript was that Furlong ends almost every sentence by asking/stating "right." This isn't a real issue; it just became kind of funny once I noticed it.

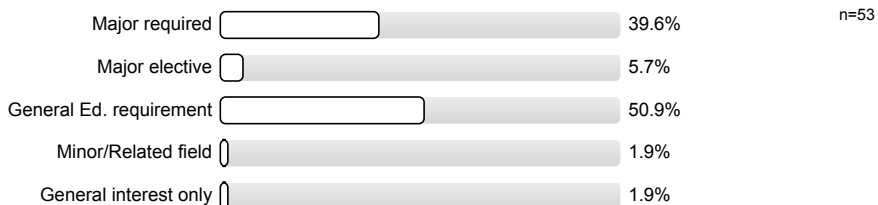
- Some parts felt irrelevant
- Something that needed improvement for the course would be the instructions for specific assignments. For the podcast assignment, something needed to be added to the rubric that the Professor and TA would be looking for in our podcast, but because it wasn't explicitly stated, many students didn't do it. We were only told by our TA that we needed to directly discuss course concepts in our podcast a week after the assignment had been due. However, the assignment instructions only said that students had to talk about and interview someone about how COVID-19 changed a space or place in their area. Also, the professor and TA said we were required to interview someone for this assignment, but in the assignment instructions, it's only listed as a suggestion to interview someone. So I would say they need to work on making their assignment instructions more clear.

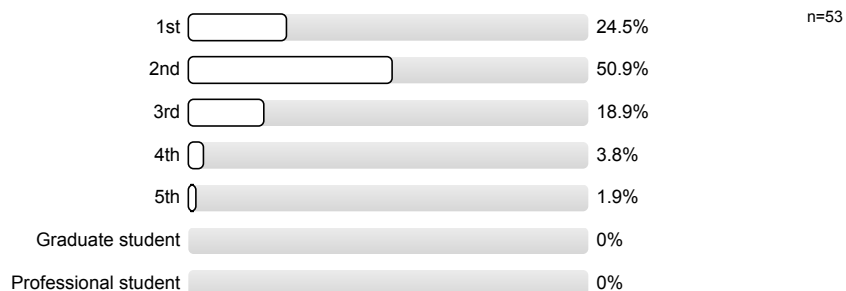

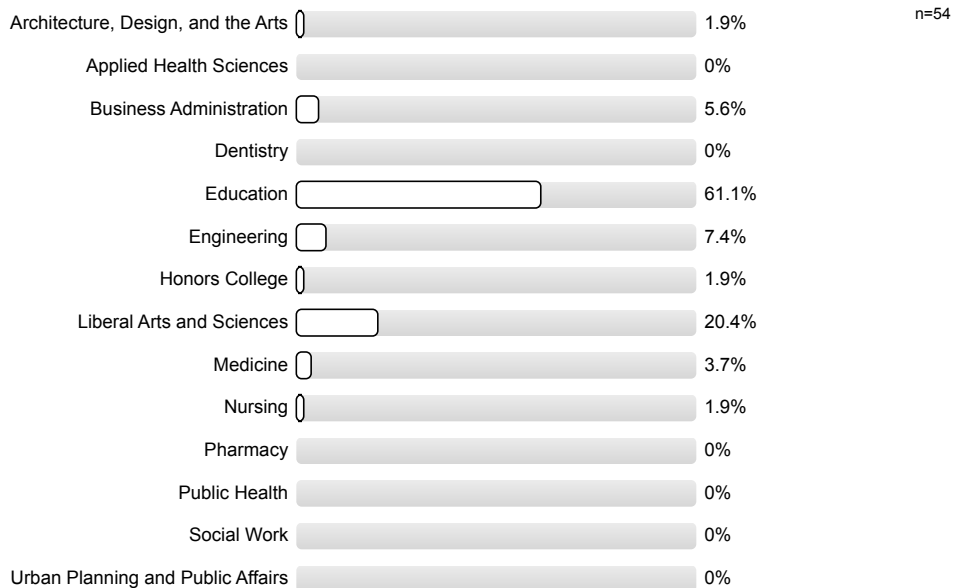

Written feedback was often helpful on future assignments. Breaking down texts and how they connect to the central themes of the class during lectures was incredibly useful when completing writing assignments.

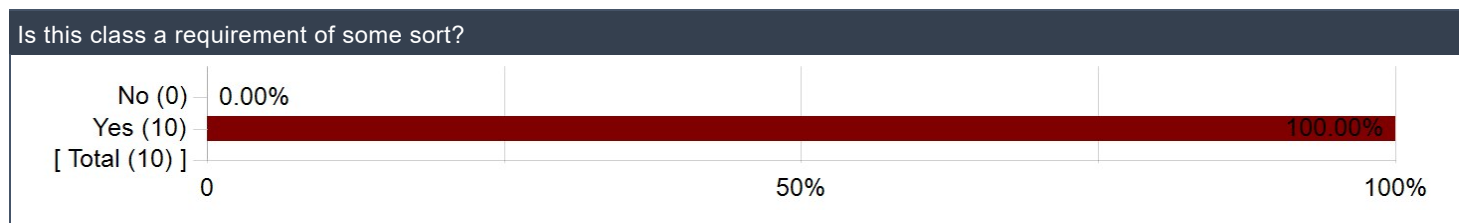
What could the instructor modify to help you learn more?

Not really sure if this is the instructor's fault but no one really discussed in class. I don't know he could've fixed that. I think he was engaging and did a great job regardless.
Maybe give more clear guidelines on what constitutes a good essay.
Ask question that lead to conversations between classmates. It felt like we were only speaking for and to him at points. Our class was particularly quiet except one or two students, but I feel like he could have facilitated more discussion between students.
i did feel strongly that at times he was very passive, and could've structured the course a bit better. we had group projects that were assigned the very first day of class, but half the people forgot which group they were in or who their partners were and overall it felt very chaotic and unorganized. i would love it if he could just be more firm and clear about things. also, though i really appreciate his efforts to get us to talk during discussion, very few people spoke up during class discussion because we just didn't know what to talk about. the questions we were posed were very broad and difficult, sometimes we didn't even understand what question he was asking us to discuss. it felt like a steep learning curve and i wish he would pose more discussion questions that are more simple and easily approachable, and then build onto the larger questions instead of just asking difficult questions over and over again.
It would be helpful to have clearer standards for success on the writing assignments. The feedback given was helpful, but I could not tell if my writing was improving over the course of the quarter.
Could break down what specific terms that are important to the text mean especially in the context of how it connects to how we are analyzing the work.

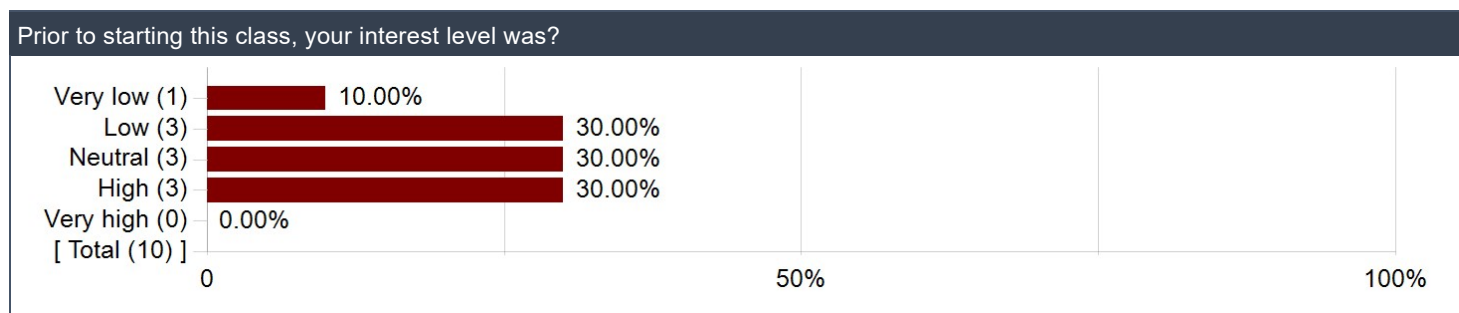

Having guiding prompts for small group discussion were very helpful in further practicing how to analyze the texts that we analyzed in the shorter writing assignments.

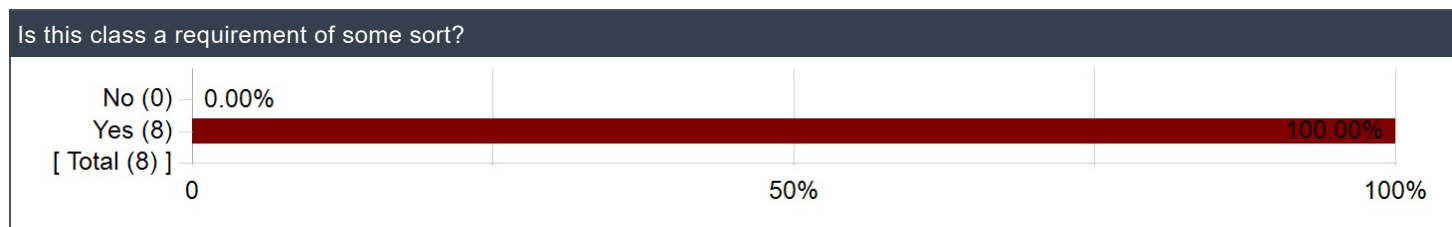
What could the instructor modify to help you learn more?

I had difficulty focusing during the longer lecture periods and whole class discussion, so having more activities where we can engage with the material in smaller groups would be nice.

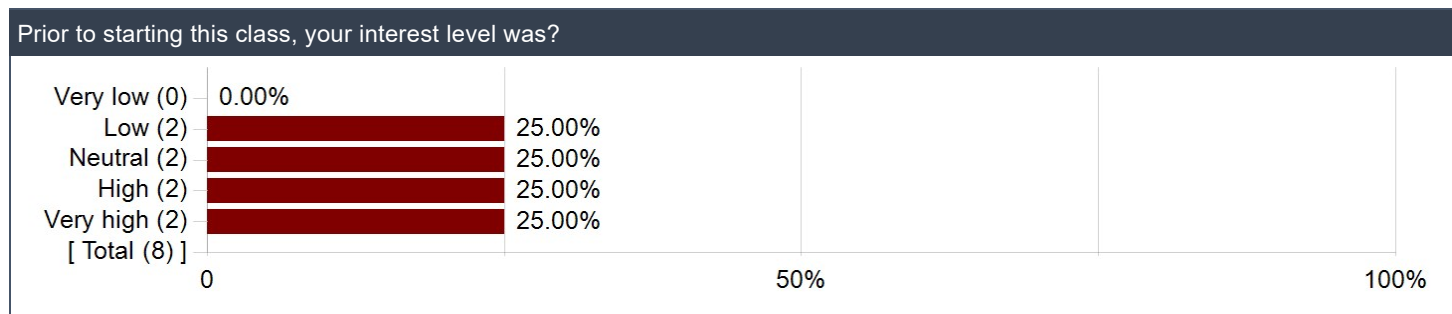

His depth of knowledge was really what made the course wonderful. He helped the class draw out the central ideas in each text and synthesis it.

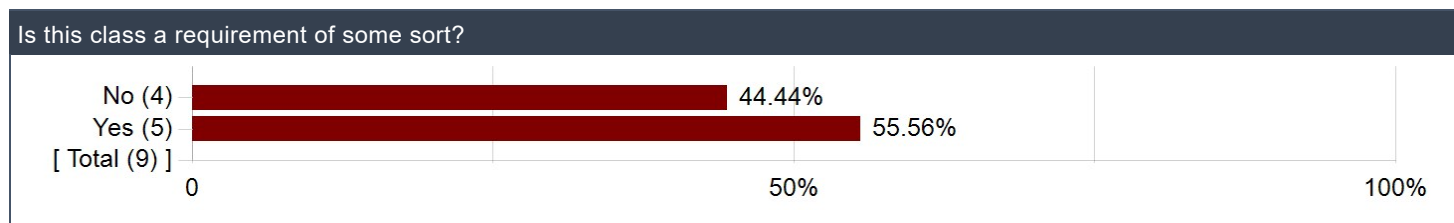
What could the instructor modify to help you learn more?
